

Introduce each voting method with a **brief reading** passage explanation, which includes arguments from proponents and opponents.


Real-life election results from sample states are included to illustrate the method compared to the currently used winner-take-all system.

III. SIMULATE & CALCUATE



Students partner up, roll some dice, and simulate Election Day tallying with their results!

Concluding Reflection & Synthesis sheet included for students to make their final assessment of the various methods and their recommendation for which the US should use.
