



ICEBREAKER & TEAM BUILDING



LEADERSHIP DEFINING & BRAINSTORMING








PERSONAL INVENTORIES

Yes! All student materials come in both print PDF and editable Google versions, so you can customize them to meet your student's needs. Still, due to the nature of these being teambuilding and collaborative activities, they really should be completed on paper, not on computers.

Totally! You should do a few core things at the start of any group: team building, discussing the meaning of leadership, assessing current issues, goal setting, and reflecting on personal assets. For each of these, there are multiple activities included. Mix and match whichever combo works for your group and time constraints!
