I. IDEA & SUBMISSION

Someone comes up with an idea Must have a sponsor, may have co-sponsors Likely discussed within a caucus

II. COMMITTEE

All Congress members sit on committees Scrutinize, debate, hear testimony on bill Vast majority of bills die here





III. FLOOR DEBATE & VOTE

Debate rules are decided in the House Senate bill essentially must have 3/5th to even get debated on the floor

IV. SIGN OR VETO

The President has the final say

An unsigned bill becomes law after 10 days or can be "pocket" vetoed

Vetoes require 2/3rds override


CURRENT MEMBERS OF CONGRESS




